Outlook for Passage

WHAT'S THE MOST LIKELY OUTCOME AT THIS POINT?

- The Senate attempts to develop a bipartisan reauthorization bill that could receive 60 votes in the Senate
 - This is already in question because Republicans have no incentive to deliver a "win" to Democrats by passing a long-term reauthorization.
- Chairman DeFazio's reauthorization within H.R. 2 becomes part of a reconciliation package, to the extent that is possible.
- Both parties agree that Earmarks are back!

Safety

- Dedication of funding to Complete Streets Planning
- Creates Vulnerable Road User Assessments
- Expansion of the Safe Routes to School Program
 - Program now applies THROUGH 12th grade
 - To enable and encourage high school students to walk and bike to school

Reconnecting Communities

- Emphasis and funding to reconnect communities that were disconnected by past infrastructure projects
- \$500 Million toward developing a pilot program

Permit and Approval Process Streamlining

- Environmental review for major projects streamlined
 - Timelines and deadlines to complete Federal Environmental Documentation
 - Accountability when deadlines are missed
 - Limitations to document sizes
 - Expansion of Categorical Exclusions

Bridge Investment Program

- Creates a new competitive grant program to assist local governments
 - Rehabilitation or replacement
 - Includes Culverts
 - Promotes Bundling
 - \$600 million in FY 2022
 - Rising to \$700 million in FY 2026
 - State and Tribal Governments included also

Rural Surface Transportation Grant Program

- Creates a new rural surface transportation grant program
 - Competitive grant program
 - Goals
 - Increase Connectivity
 - Improve Safety and Reliability
 - Emphasis on moving People and Freight
 - Generating Economic Development

Climate Change

- National Highway Performance Program (NHPP)
 - Emphasis on Climate Change and Increasing Resiliency
- Carbon Reduction Program (Formula)
 - Establishes a Carbon Reduction Program to reduce transportation emissions.
 Eligible projects include:
 - Construction, planning, and design of on-road and off-road trail facilities
 - Advanced transportation and congestion management technologies
 - Deployment of infrastructure-based intelligent transportation systems
 - Installation of vehicle to infrastructure (V2I) communications equipment
 - Development of a carbon reduction strategy

Future Mobility

- Establish a pilot program to demonstrate a national motor vehicle permile user fee
 - Program will solicit volunteers to be a part of the demonstration
 - Focus on Equity for volunteer cohort
- Micromobility Congestion Mitigation Air Quality (CMAQ) Eligibility
 - Bike Share program would be eligible for CMAQ
- Connected and Automated Vehicle Support

Now What?

It is important to remember this is only the first step in what will be a long bipartisan and bicameral process. Here's what needs to happen:

- 1. Senate Passes Bill out of Committee DONE
- 2. Full Senate Votes in Favor of Bill (60 votes) DONE
- 3. House Pass Bill out of Committee DONE
- 4. Full House Votes in favor of Bill (Majority vote needed)
- 5. Chambers go to Conference (A conference Committee is members from both chambers selected (by leadership) to work together to form one Bill from the House and Senate versions.)
- 6. Conferees (members of Conference Committee) must sign off on the one bill that will then go to both chambers for a vote.
- 7. Both Chambers must pass the Conference Committee Bill (Conference Report).
- 8. President Signs Legislation, thus becoming law.
